CONTRIBUTIONS AND CHARGES

Payment of Voluntary Contributions and Charges can be made at the College Administration Office prior to the commencement of the school year. The Secondary Assistance Scheme form (available in Term 4 2026) can be completed at this time.

The following information is provided in the hope of making the school charges and contributions structure clear for parents/guardians. Atwell College has directed our efforts towards keeping costs as low and as equitable as possible. The Atwell College Board and Finance Committee have examined the contributions and charges structure in detail and approved the amounts shown in accordance with the School Education Act 1999.

The State Government through the Department of Education provides placement at educational facilities for all students who choose to attend public schools. The Department also pays for the wages of all teaching and school support staff plus costs such as repairs, maintenance and utilities. Government does not provide for many goods and services which students use, and it is reasonable for parents/guardians to meet these costs.

Contributions and charges go towards a variety of consumable items across learning areas, including Science chemicals, art equipment, ingredients for cooking, student project materials and photocopying.

How much can be charged?

Course costs within this handbook are **anticipated** and will be confirmed when the Contributions and Charges are approved by the College Board. Parents/guardians will be advised before the end of Term Four 2026.

Collecting Contributions & Charges

Given that all students benefit from the pool of collected fees, it is fair to expect that all parents/guardians should pay the balance of contributions and charges. This college is committed to an even-handed and responsible approach and it is our expectation that all parents/guardians should make contributions towards their children's education.

Atwell College is aware that the payment of contributions and charges can be a financial burden for some families. Payment plans are available to support parents/guardians experiencing difficulties. Please email our Accounts at atwell.col.accounts@education.wa.edu.au to discuss payment options. The college is keen to assist parents/guardians in selecting options that they can afford. To this end, subject charges will always be provided to parents/guardians prior to selection of subjects. The College Board and the Finance Committee have endorsed and passed all subjects costs charged by the college.

The College Board has endorsed the following actions:

- Regular statements will be sent home to parents/guardians.
- Approved Extension Programs will require a deposit to secure a place.

COMPULSORY CHARGES

For Years 11 and 12 there are no maximum charges set by the State Government. Schools set their own charges for these years, and such charges are compulsory. The college can also request a 50% confirmation charge for these years.

Charges will depend upon the course chosen. Some specific courses will incur higher costs dependent upon such items as textbooks, subject specific resources, materials, excursions, certificates and work placement. Students involved in work placement must pay the associated fees prior to commencement of the work placement.

Year 10 Subjects with cost above \$100 will incur a 50% deposit by Friday 4 December 2026 to confirm placement otherwise students may be moved out to other subjects. The balance of payment is due Thursday 8 April 2027.

Students offered selected off-site programs delivered by external providers such as Certificates will be invoiced by the external providers.

Booklist and Personal Items

Recommended personal and stationery items will be detailed on the Personal Items List (to be provided in Term 3 2026). The college will have a preferred supplier (TBC) but parents/guardians have the option of purchasing the items independently from another supplier.

SECONDARY ASSISTANCE SCHEME

Applications close Friday 9 April 2027

The [Secondary Assistance Scheme](#) is available to secondary students whose parent/guardian holds a Centrelink Family Health Care Card, a Pensioner Concession Card or a Veteran's Affairs Pensioner Concession Card. The scheme is available to students up to and including the year in which they turn 18 years of age.



Applications are made by the parent/guardian for students enrolled in Years 7 - 12. It is preferable that applications are made prior to the beginning of the school year or as early as possible in Term One. Application forms are available from the college administration and these forms must be submitted prior to the end of Term One 2027.

The Secondary Assistance Scheme is made up of two allowances:

- \$235.00 Education Program Allowance - will be paid directly to the college and applied towards the payment of compulsory charges.
- \$115.00 Clothing Allowance – paid directly to the parent/carer or to the College to be allocated towards any charges and then contributions. These funds cannot be transferred to the uniform shop by the College.
- If payment is to be made to the Parent/ Guardian, the payment will be deposited into the nominated bank account. It can take between 8 to 12 weeks to receive this payment.

Late Applications

Late applications will only be accepted in extenuating circumstances and must be accompanied with a written explanation. Eligible interstate or overseas students who are enrolled after first term may apply for the allowance. The date of enrolment must be noted on the application.

VOLUNTARY APPROVED REQUEST

Under government guidelines, the College requests a Voluntary Contribution of up to \$235.00 for each student. These contributions are used to provide resources for the compulsory learning areas: Mathematics, English, Science, Humanities and Social Sciences, Technologies, the Arts, Health & Physical Education and Languages. The payment of Voluntary Contributions will make a significant contribution to the quality of educational programs delivered. There is an expectation that families who can afford to pay the Voluntary Contributions do so.

Chaplaincy Fund (\$25.00)

An individual levy has been requested to support the presence of a non-denominational chaplain. The Chaplain provides a valuable service to the students and their families by encouraging, motivating, and inspiring young people to be the best they can be and help them through life issues that may threaten their potential. This position is solely funded by the community and your donations.

Information Technology Fund (\$25.00)

This cost is used towards the resourcing and updating of IT materials for all students. It is a valuable resource in assisting your child with their educational programs and having access to the most up to date and modern technology. The Department of Education provides limited funding to provide resources for this centre.

Library Contribution (\$25.00)

An individual levy has been requested to support the library in the acquisition of resources for students to ensure current resources are readily available to supplement the present-day curriculum.

P&C Contribution (\$25.00)

The P&C is comprised of voluntary members who make a vital contribution to the school. This contribution enables the P&C to purchase much needed equipment for students' use. The P&C can also support fundraising for school tours and PBS events.

Payment of these costs is voluntary, however payment is encouraged and appreciated.

OTHER COSTS

Smartrider Cards

Smartrider cards are issued to all new students following the completion of a Smartrider Application form. The Smartrider card is free, however, the cost of a replacement card is \$5.00.

Safety Glasses

It is a safety requirement for students to supply their own Approved Safety Glasses for all Design and Technology classes.

Contributions

Contributions in WA Public Schools are set at a maximum of \$235.00 per student for a nominal curriculum. Funds raised from school charges are expended on texts, resources and equipment essential for curriculum delivery and which are not supplied by the government.

Textbooks

In some instances, textbooks are made available to students as class sets to minimise costs for parents/guardians. Please be aware that a replacement cost will be charged if a textbook is lost or badly damaged.

Calculators

A scientific calculator is a minimum requirement for Years 7 to 10 – See Personal Items List (to be provided in Term 3 2026).

Optional

Other optional costs include but are not limited to camps, excursions, performances, rewards excursions, college balls, college photos and workshops.

These costs are anticipated costs for 2027 and are subject to change. You will be advised of any changes to the charges for these courses. Please be advised that if courses do not attract viable numbers, they will not run and students will be asked to select an alternative course.

For any student participating in a SIDE (School of Isolated and Distance Education) course, the cost will vary. The college will advise at the time of enrolment on the SIDE course.

OVERVIEW

The focus of schooling in Year 10 is to continue to develop broad educational knowledge and skills.

All students in Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 will be required to enrol in compulsory courses each year. These compulsory courses include English, Science, Mathematics, Humanities & Social Sciences and Health & Physical Education. These courses will become increasingly challenging as students move up the year levels. Contributions and charges for these courses will be detailed on a fee sheet which will be posted to parents/guardians after student selections are finalised.

EXTENSION PROGRAMS

The following programs are designed to meet the needs of selected students in a particular area of the curriculum.

Academic Extension Program (AEP)

At Atwell College, our Academic Extension Program (AEP) is designed to challenge students academically and build on their self-management and reflection skills, developing well rounded independent learners. The College offers Academic Extension classes in four learning areas: English, Humanities & Social Sciences, Mathematics and Science. Placement in these classes is reviewed at the end of every semester.

Education Support

Atwell College caters for students with a full spectrum of disabilities, from severe intellectually disabled individuals with complex needs in a specialist building to students with mild disabilities in small classes in general learning areas. There is a focus on student centered planning that encompasses the academic programs as well as the social emotional wellbeing of students.

The Kim Beazley Learning Centre (KBLC) building is a purpose-built, safe facility for students with special needs. The building is equipped with a hydrotherapy pool, specialist sensory equipment and life skills training rooms and can cater for therapists who attend the school.

Netball Program (NBP) (only available to previously selected students)

Atwell College is endorsed as a Tier 1 Netball School by Netball Western Australia. This endorsement recognises the Netball Program as one of the Top 5 Netball School Programs in the State. Students have the opportunity to excel in the sport as athletes, coaches, umpires and officials for the future. Knowledge, strategies and tactics of Netball are assimilated in a progressive way to ensure athletes move from a basic to an advanced level.

Rugby League Program (RLP) (only available to previously selected students)

Atwell College is one of Western Australia's leading Rugby League schools. The school-based Rugby League Program is an elite sporting program developed by Atwell College in conjunction with the National Rugby League Western Australia. The program helps engage students at school and provides outstanding opportunities to develop specific skills, knowledge and experiences.

ELECTIVE SUBJECTS 2027

In addition to the compulsory courses for all students, Year 9 students will be able to choose from an additional selection of elective courses.

To assist with the process Atwell College expects that:

- Students, parents and guardians are aware of the academic results from the Year 9 Semester One report once available.
- Students, parents and guardians have read the information provided in this handbook.

Students will use the Subject Selection Online (SSO) system to complete their elective course selection. Information on how to access and use the system will be communicated on Compass.

Using SSO, students will rank their preferred electives for the year from 1 to 10. Whilst Atwell College will endeavour to accommodate students' first six course choices, an insufficient number of students choosing a course or gridline clashes may result in some students having to be placed in their reserve courses, so it is important students carefully consider their selections and include at least 2 reserve choices in their subject selection. The ranked list will assist in placing students in the next available subject, so preferred rankings should be completed thoughtfully.

Where it is not specifically indicated, semester electives will run in either Semester 1 and/or Semester 2. More details will be provided when selecting electives in SSO.

HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Basketball - Semester Elective – 10BBL7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$30 per semester

In this course, students will learn the fundamentals of Basketball and engage in a variety of different Basketball activities and games designed to enhance their skills. We aim to foster opportunities for talented players to participate in competitive Basketball tournaments and help them develop the skills and values such as respect, leadership, teamwork and discipline to be demonstrated in a team environment. This option should only be selected by students who will be active participants and are genuinely interested in the game of Basketball.

Netball Program - Year Elective – 10NBP7/8

Rugby League Program - Year Elective – 10RLP7/8

- Netball 2026 Course cost \$230 per year
- Rugby League 2026 Course cost \$75 per year
- Prerequisite: C grade or higher in Year 9 Netball or Rugby League Program

Students are selected based on their athletic ability, skill level, behaviour, grades and commitment. See information on the College website for further details.

Physical Education Advanced - Semester Elective – 10PEA7/8

- 2027 Anticipated Course cost \$30 per semester
- Prerequisite: B grade or higher in Year 9 Physical Education, Netball or Rugby League Program

In this course, students will have the opportunity to gain some insight into senior school Physical Education. The course has elements of Physical Education Studies and Sport and Recreation and will involve playing, coaching and umpiring in a competitive sporting environment. There will also be a focus on sports education and management with students planning, facilitating and reviewing sports programs and competitions. This elective is designed to appeal to students who have a genuine interest in Sports and Physical Education and are active participants in this space.

HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCE

Career and Business Studies - Semester Elective – 10CBS7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$16 per semester

Students will learn valuable skills that will help with their personal and career development in a rapidly changing world. The course will cover topics such as personal finance, budgeting, use of Microsoft Office, business recordkeeping and managing their career. Students will be taught the practical skills required in today's workplace and explore different career pathways they may be suited to.

TECHNOLOGIES

Design and Technologies

Computer Aided Drawing - Semester Elective – 10CAD7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$16 per semester

This course will develop students' drawing skills using Industry Standard Autodesk software. Students will learn how to use the software to draw mechanical plans and 3D representations of products using industry conventions. It is highly advisable to take this course if you are interested in occupations such as Drafting and Engineering or any Mechanical or Fabrication Industry.

Engineering Studies - Year Elective – 10EST7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$100 per year

Working in teams of 4-5, students will be entered in the H2GP Hydrogen Grand Prix competition. This exciting STEM competition, backed by resources giant Chevron, tasks students with developing a hydrogen fuel-cell powered radio-controlled car. Students will be required to develop a high-performance RC car to the H2GP regulations, develop team systems and procedures to maximise performance as a team, and engineer improvements to the fuel cell system and data logging systems to perform at a high level in the competition. The WA state champions get a trip overseas to the World Finals – a fantastic opportunity for any budding motorsport engineers!

This course pairs well with Computer Aided Drawing for students looking at an engineering pathway for Year 11 and 12 and beyond.

Metal Technology - Semester Elective – 10MET7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$120 per semester

A practical based subject including the use of Computer Aided Drawing software to design projects made predominantly from metal. Students will be expected to follow Occupational Health and Safety Legislation to safely use tools and machines commonly found in industry. A variety of welding and brazing processes will be taught along with the use of lathes and bending equipment commonly found in the Metal Fabrication Industries. Developing hand skills will be a predominant focus in this course with the projects the students make varying according to their skill level and interest. This course will assist in preparing students to take on the General courses in Engineering Studies, Metalwork or Woodwork offered in Year 11 and 12.

Wood Technology - Semester Elective – 10WDT7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$120 per semester

A practical based subject that includes the use of Computer Aided Drawing software to design projects made predominantly from wood. Students will be expected to learn and follow Occupational Health and Safety Legislation in the workplace to safely use tools and machines commonly found in the woodworking industry such as the Band saw, router, biscuit cutter and drill press. The projects the students make vary according to their skill level and interest.

This course will assist in preparing students to take on the General courses in Engineering Studies, Metalwork or Woodwork offered in Year 11 and 12.

Home Economics

Café Foods – Semester 1 Elective – 10CAF7

- 2026 Course cost \$100 per semester

Year 10 Cafe Foods is the introduction to Hospitality and Food, Science and Technology – General, with students being able to develop basic kitchen skills required for the preparation and presentation of food as well as gaining an insight into cafe trends. Students will learn basic barista skills and prepare and present cafe style foods while working in small groups. Students will also learn the processes of choosing recipes, costing, ordering and preparing sweet and savoury recipes of their choice.

Entertaining with Food – Semester 2 Elective – 10ETF8

- 2026 Course cost \$100 per semester

This energetic elective involves students learning and practicing various cooking techniques to make both sweet and savoury recipes. New trends, ethical production and new technologies will be included in this course. The emphasis is on advanced food preparation skills which can lead the students into the Year 11 and 12 Certificate Courses and continue with a career in hospitality and catering. Students will experience and investigate a variety of recipes and prepare and design suitable choices for functions. They will also learn many aspects of hospitality and catering such as table service, table decoration, plating and garnishing.

Fashion - Semester Elective – 10FAS7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$100 per semester

This Fashion course is a continuation of the Year 9 course with a focus on current fashion trends and developing an individual style. Students will also investigate different styles and colours to suit different people. They will develop practical skills and knowledge as well as gain an insight into the fashion/clothing industry while using a variety of design techniques to construct items and express creativity. Students will also learn about the impact of clothing production on the environment and how to buy/make garments that are ethical. This course is suited to students with an interest in careers in Fashion design, Fashion coordinator, costume maker, wardrobe supervisor and visual merchandiser.

Textiles - Semester Elective – 10TEX7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$100 per semester

This textiles course is a continuation from the Year 9 Textiles course. Students will construct a variety of soft furnishings for their rooms and around the home using their own creative designs and styles. This course is a pathway to the Year 11 Textiles course and is suited to students with an interest in careers of fabric design, interior design, set design and craftsperson. Students will learn the relevant skills of using the sewing machine, hand stitching, overlocking and looking at new technologies to help with design and textile production.

The Developing Child - Semester Elective – 10TDC7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$80 per semester

This course is suitable for students who enjoy being around or are interested in working with infants and young children. A range of practical and interactive activities will assist students with the investigation of family structures, birth, caring for a newborn and the physical, social/emotional and cognitive development of a child over the first five years of life. The opportunity to care for an electronic RealCare baby, as part of a parenting simulation, will solidify some of the theoretical work completed in the course regarding skills that will assist students in caring for infants and young children. This course provides a solid foundation for students interested in studying Children, Family and Community - General or the Certificate II in Communities Services in Years 11 and 12.

THE ARTS

Class Music - Year Elective – 10MUS7/8

Instrumental Music Specialist - Year Elective – 10MUS7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$80 per year

In this course, students cover a wide variety of genres, styles and topics related to music and are provided with an introduction to concepts related to contemporary music production, in a practical and interactive way. The course promotes exploration and creativity using current music technology and trends. A background in playing a musical instrument is required for this subject. This course is compulsory for IMSS students.

Students will require an online Auralia & Musition Subscription.

Dance – Hip Hop and Jazz - Semester Elective – 10DAN7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$16 per semester

The Hip Hop & Jazz Dance course introduces the students to new genres and choreography to popular music. There will be a focus on Hip Hop styles such as tutting and breakdancing, energetic choreography plus genre specific technique. Students will improve their coordination, balance, strength and flexibility and have the opportunity to perform their Hip Hop or Jazz routine in front of a live audience.

Drama – Semester Elective - 10DRA7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$16 per semester

This course covers a range of styles including Realist Theatre to Theatre of the Absurd and Street Theatre. Students will prepare and perform a variety of original and scripted pieces for performance. This course may include a professional theatre company production incursion/excursion that will incur an additional cost.

Graphic Design - Semester Elective – 10GRD7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$25 per semester

Using computers and tablets, students will learn the different techniques and ways that graphic designers create illustrations, manipulate photos, master fonts in Adobe programs and access to drawing tablets and much more. Unleash the designer within! This course will assist in preparing students to take on the design courses offered in Year 11 and 12.

Media - Documentaries & Film Subversion – Semester Elective – 10MED7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$16 per semester

In Year 10 Media, students will create 60-second documentaries exploring interesting facets of human life. Following this focus, students then create a genre-flipped subversion of a film trailer, for example a remake of Mary Poppins as a Horror. Students are tasked with the creation of a 60-second documentary of their own, showcasing their special interests. Each student fulfils individual roles during pre-production, production, and post-production phases in their production groups. Students use Canon 200 DSLR cameras and equipment to record in front of the Green Screen Kit. Students also learn to use Adobe Premiere Pro to edit out the Green Screen Kit and replace it with a suitable background relating to the topic to display their expertise.

Media - Gaming Culture and Merchandise - Semester Elective – 10MED7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$16 per semester

Explore various aspects of gaming subculture that will culminate in the creation of an e-commerce website that displays items that are commonly sold to pander to gamers, such as themed t-shirts and sticker sets. Learn about new media concepts in the sphere of gaming such as the extension of self, symbolism, gender representation, and genre. Students will be using Adobe Dreamweaver to create their e-commerce websites. Adobe InDesign will be employed to portfolio student's t-shirt and sticker creation using Adobe Illustrator.

Mixing and Sampling Music – Semester Elective – 10MSM7/8

- 2027 Anticipated Course cost \$35 per semester

Will you be the hottest new DJ on the scene? Students develop their musical skills to create works of their own using software and technology. No instrumental skills are required but always beneficial. A keen ear for beat matching and blending will get you off and running! It is recommended that students have their own device that has appropriate software such as GarageBand that they can use so that they can continue their coursework at home and provide students with the best opportunity to develop to their full potential.

Photography - Semester Elective – 10PHO7/8

- 2026 Course cost \$35 per semester

The photography course is designed to provide students with the knowledge and skills required to produce photographic images of a high standard. If you enjoy the art of photography and would like to develop your skills this course is best suited for you.

Visual Art 2D - Semester Elective – 10VA2

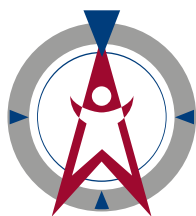
- 2027 Anticipated Course cost \$55 per semester

Students will be involved in a range of Visual Arts 2-Dimensional artworks, including painting, printmaking and/or drawing. Students will investigate contemporary and historical artists in their artwork and will have the opportunity to display their work around the college.

Visual Art 3D - Semester Elective – 10VA3

- 2027 Anticipated Course cost \$55 per semester

Students will be involved in a range of Visual Arts 3-Dimensional artworks, including ceramics (clay) and/or sculpture. Students will investigate contemporary and historical artists in their artwork and will have the opportunity to display their work around the college.
